What To Do In Your Garden Now

- Remove old vegetable stalks to prevent insect and disease problems next year.
- Spread manure and incorporate it into the soil to get a jump-start on next year.
- Lightly mulch roses and other tender plants for added winter protection.
- Clean up any debris from any plants that had insect or disease problems. Many pests and diseases will over winter in the debris.
- Avoid pruning evergreens—fall pruning makes them more susceptible to winter damage.
- Fall is a great time to plant. You can plant trees and shrubs until the ground is frozen.
- Once there is a killing frost (24°F and below), you can safely cut back perennials. If not, cut them back in spring.





The Perennial Plant Association (PPA) announced that 'Jeana', a cultivar of garden phlox, has been names its 2024 Plant of the Year.

Lavender-pink flowers bloom from midsummer to early fall and are attractive to hummingbirds, butterflies—especially eastern tiger swallowtails—and other pollinators.

Biggest reward — Its highly resistant to powdery mildew and it looks great even when not flowering;
